

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
On the 17th of February 2022 ACBA hosted a webinar titled: The Role of Responsible Tourism In Saving Great Apes From Zoonotic Diseases In Africa In collaboration with International Gorilla Conservation Programme (IGCP) and Conservation Through Public Health (CTPH).

The webinar was influenced by the development of a policy brief a year ago on "Africa's Great Apes Tourism and COVID-19". Building on the actions from last year, the policy brief has been updated to include all Great Ape Tourism sites in Africa, new developments in great ape tourism and the management of COVID-19.



The policy brief aimed at about creating awareness the challenges of great ape tourism in Africa especially now during the COVID-19 pandemic. It also highlighted several recommendations to government leaders, private sector (including Tour Operators) and tourists on what should be done to address the existing great ape tourism challenges.

A couple of activities including development of graphic materials, a social media campaign and a webinar targeting tour operators and key conservationists in Africa was successfully conducted last year and this current webinar discussed the policy brief and amplify as well as emphasize the need for great ape tourism best practices at all great ape tourism sites in Africa.



This webinar attracted over 84 participants and gave the audience the highlights on what recommendations are there to save the Great Ape and also created awareness on the challenges faced by Great Ape tourism in Africa.

The webinar was moderated by Simangele Msweli who is the Senior Manager, Youth Leadership Program at AWF, the speakers in the webinar included Dr Johannes Refisch who is the coordinator for Great Apes Survival Partnership, Mr Praveen Moman the founder of Volcanoes Safaris, Dr Gladys kalema-Zikusoka the CEO of Conservation Through Public Health and Dr Emmanuelle Normand who is the director of Wildlife Chimpanzee Foundation. The event focused on South-South infrastructure cooperation for #biodiversity and the achievement of the #SDGs with the aim to strengthen partnership, promote cooperation and coordination on designing and implementing inclusive, resilient and sustainable infrastructure and facilitating implementation of the #post2020GBF.

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
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FUN FACT (TEASER)





DYK? The 8th of March every year is observed as International Women's Day which is celebrated across the world? This day is dedicated to celebrate women for their social, economical, political and cultural achievements.



CTPH Non-Governmental Organization that promotes biodiversity conservation by enabling people, gorillas and other wildlife to co-exist through improving their health and community livelihoods in and around Africa's protected areas. CTPH was founded in 2003 after Dr. Gladys Kalema Zikusoka - who was working for the Uganda Wildlife Authority at as their first wildlife veterinarian led a team that traced a fatal scabies skin disease outbreak in the endangered mountain gorillas of Bwindi Impenetrable National Park to the surrounding communities.

Poor access to health services and limited livelihood opportunities led to poor health and wellbeing, and high levels of poverty, amongst the communities living in proximity to wildlife.

This put the endangered mountain gorillas at risk of zoonotic disease transmission and poaching, driven by poverty. It was evident that a single sector approach could not address the inextricable links between people, gorillas and other wildlife. For this reason, CTPH began implementing an integrated intervention using a multi-sectoral approach that improves the health and well-being of community members living around Africa's protected areas, as well as conserving wildlife and reducing human-wildlife conflict.

CTPH has three integrated strategic programs which include; Wildlife Conservation which is wildlife health including gorilla health monitoring and wildlife disease surveillance through comparative pathogen analysis with people and livestock to understand pathways of transmission of disease and respond in a timely manner; ranger training in wildlife health monitoring

and management of tourists during visits to the gorillas; training community volunteers called Human and Gorilla Conflict resolution teams (HUGOs), or Gorilla Guardians, in gorilla health monitoring and safely herding gorillas from community land back to the park.

Community Health which focuses on establishment and training community volunteers called Village Health and Conservation Teams (VHCTs) to conduct household peer-to-peer behavior change communication, on key conservation, health, hygiene, and family planning issues as well as deliver services; and training community animal health workers to promote conservation.



Alternative Livelihoods in which Gorilla Conservation Coffee (a social enterprise of CTPH) supports smallholder coffee farmers living around Impenetrable National Park to have a viable livelihood reducing their need to enter the park for food and firewood, decreasing threats to gorillas and their habitats. They are trained to grow premium or specialty coffee, which is bought above market price, and sold to tourists, and people living in Uganda as well as in other countries. Furthermore, a donation from every bag of coffee sold supports community health, gorilla health and conservation education programs of CTPH, enabling sustainable financing for conservation.

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#WEAREHERE CAMPAIGN
